Sunday May 1: Religious Brothers Day on the Feast Of St. Joseph The Worker

Today, the Archdiocese of Cincinnati celebrates Religious Brothers Day on the Feast of St. Joseph The Worker. As a parish staffed and in the Marianist Tradition, it is a day to celebrate and be thankful for the Marianists brothers and priests who have served and witnessed at this parish for nearly forty years.

Yet, many do not have a clear understanding who a religious brother is. Most everyone can name and define a priest, deacon and sister, but the brother is often in the shadows of the unknown. The following hopefully is a helpful definition to describe a religious brother:

"A religious brother is a member of a Roman Catholic religious order who commits himself to following Christ in consecrated life of the church by the vows of poverty, celibacy (chastity), and obedience. Not ordained, he usually lives in a religious community and works in a ministry that suits his talents and gifts. A brother might be a teacher, electrician, cook, technician, parish minister, artist etc."

In the Marianist tradition, which is different from many other religious orders, there is the belief and practice of *Mixed Composition*. Simply stated, this is a way of life in the Marianist tradition where brothers and priests are equals in their life and service to the church. Marianists often refer to their priests as "ordained brothers." In the Marianist Rule of Life it states"

"There is only one Marianists vocation, but we welcome as our members men of varied background and training. All have the same rights and duties as religious. The one Spirit is manifest in a variety of complementary gifts and ministries.

Thus the Marianist community seeks to portray a more faithful image of the Church; it rejoices in the mutual enrichment this mixed composition brings to its community of life and mission."

In 2015, Megan Mustain of Trinity University spoke at of The University of Dayton regarding Marianist Mixed Composition":

"Our first Marianist resource is 'mixed composition,' the full and equal inclusion of laypersons, Sisters, Brothers, and Priests in the Marianist family. William Joseph Chaminade modeled the composition of the Marianist community on that of the Church, the Body of Christ, properly

conceived. The church was not its priests, though they were essential. Nor was it its non-clerical religious, though they too were essential. Nor was it its committed laity, though we similarly cannot conceive of the Church without them. Chaminade looked to Jesus' own community, those he gathered and sent, and saw a group whose mixed membership was not to be dismissed as a mere historical accident. Its composition, and that of the early Christian community, was decidedly mixed-including men, women, poor, rich, tax collectors, and fisherman. For Chaminade, the fact of mix composition was meaningful, prophetic and thus ideal, and aspirational."

As we celebrate this unique gift of Marianist Mixed Composition regarding the Society of Mary today, we also celebrate it as a parish because one of the characteristics of a Marianist parish is a *community of equals*. So, on this day, it is a celebration not of the Marianist religious, it is a celebration of who we are as a parish. We thank God for the inspiration and vision of Blessed Father William Joseph Chaminade!
